
Feedback Survey Findings:

- Number of total respondents = 30
- Respondents included representation from CARE USA, Haiti, Balkans, Uganda, West Bank & Gaza, Nepal, UK, India, Canada, Austria, Timor-Leste, Egypt):
 - 77% reported having attended at least one WEIMI WebEx
 - 70% reported watching at least one of the WebEx recordings archived on the wiki
 - Main obstacle to attend: Timing conflicted with something else /wasn't convenient
 - Main obstacle to watching archived recordings: Time

Just generally learning about particular projects is relevant to my work. Learning about the techniques we're applying to measurement is also helpful for proposal development/project design
